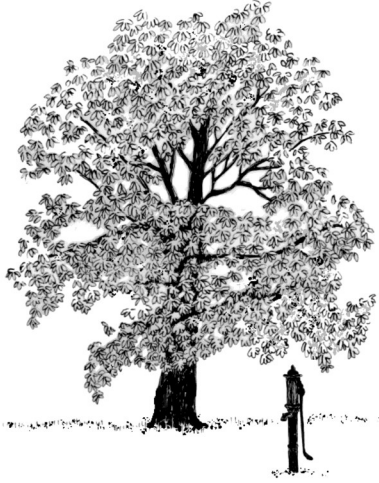

Along with others in towers across the country, Cuddington bellringers will be **Ring for the King from St. Nicholas church tower** on Saturday 6th May. The aim is to ring a quarter peel, lasting 45-50 minutes at 9:30am, ahead of the ceremony. **Listen out!**



Coronation Day Cuddington 1953

The festivities on June 2nd 1953 were celebrated with enthusiasm in the village.

The programme for the day had been planned by the Cuddington Coronation Committee. The streets had been decorated with patriotic bunting. The village shop was particularly colourful. A special service was held in St Nicholas Church on the Sunday before led by the Reverend R.A. Crawley Boevey.

Unfortunately the weather did not go to plan. June 2nd was a cold dampish day, although there were not as many showers as elsewhere in the country.

Two kindly but anonymous donors had given a sturdy teak seat which was installed on the front of the Upper Green.

The day began with a short service of dedication.

Village children then sang two songs and danced round the maypole. This seat, near the pump, was to prove very popular with village children who collected car numbers!



Thought for the month...

May brings hope for that feeling of grass under bare feet, more moments to stop at chat on the school run or on an afternoon walk, even longer evenings, maybe even a first barbecue of the season?! May 2023 also brings the Coronation of our new King, Charles III. This is the first opportunity for many of us to witness this ancient ceremony, and of course we will rightly celebrate by becoming a nation of pomp and parties with bunting, fizz, bubbles and cake aplenty! Celebration is a wonderful expression of joy and community, whether expressed at a national level or whether personal, family or village sized. Of course, we don't know yet what sort of King our new King will be. Kings of the past have been a bit of a 'mixed bunch' haven't they? Those renowned on the battlefield, like Richard the Lionheart and Kings who were wise and strategic leaders like Alfred the Great (although he is probably best remembered for an incident with cakes!). Then there were the Kings whose reigns had a difficult end like Harold with an unfortunate arrow injury to the eye, Charles I who was beheaded, and Richard III whose bones were found under a car park.



And then there was Henry VIII, a bit of a character, whose reign saw six wives, the abolition of the monasteries and a break from the Catholic Church to found the Protestant Church of England, the church our parish church of St. Nicholas belongs to. As I say, a mixed bunch, and a mixed record!

As a church we continue to celebrate the Easter season and Jesus, the King who died for those he came to serve and rose again so that we could have life everlasting. Jesus was the Servant King, who encouraged the young, spoke up for the marginalised and served those who were 'outsiders' in society. Whatever your views on the monarchy, whatever you chose to celebrate in the coming weeks, may this month bring an abundance of opportunity to gather, support, share, serve, encourage and simply be with each other.

Later, weather permitted a cricket match between the ladies and gentlemen of the village. The ladies won comfortably. The men, whether batting or bowling, were restricted to using their weaker hand...

In the Bernard Hall at 4.30pm all the children – about 80 – were presented with souvenir mugs and given a tea. One grateful recipient, a child of six at the time, recalls how proud she was to be given the mug. It is still displayed in her house.



Later the adults enjoyed a ham salad. At this stage the weather proved inclement.

The Fancy Dress Parade planned around the village was transferred to the Hall, where competitors were judged. The children then completed their exciting day with lemonade and cakes in the school and a game of musical chairs.

At 9.00pm the Queen's broadcast was relayed in the Bernard Hall. Conviviality then ensued with Agnes Alton and her friends performing some sketches.

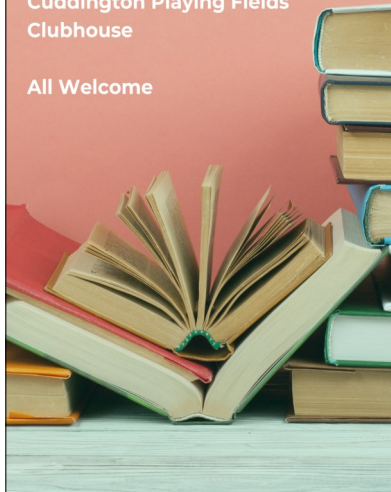

A few years have passed, and Paul is now in training for another ride for Pace, this time doing a 225 mile route from Amsterdam to Lille, from 14 to 18 June.

Pace provides specialist education, therapy and support for children with serious neurodisability, and relies heavily on voluntary income to provide its services.

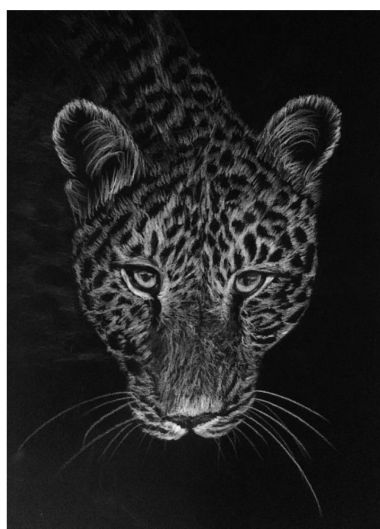

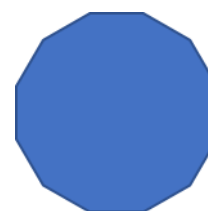

News from Palestine



ABCD has set up four rehabilitation centres in different outlying regions around Bethlehem, has had them built, has furnished them with some basic equipment, and has trained men and women how to help and care for so many young children with cerebral palsy. Because the Israelis have grabbed so much of what should be their land many Palestinians families, some of whom are refugees in their own country, live in flats in smallish enclaves, and these are ring-fenced either with walls or high barbed wire and again with checkpoints. Thus, movement is not easy so inter-marriage between the Muslim families is common, and sadly this leads to a large number of children with Cerebral Palsy.



However, the Centres are going from strength to strength thanks to the funding from ABCD. The one we visited had only one floor pre-Covid, but now has four which allow for more "classrooms"

where the children can, for example, learn to walk up and down steps, how to use their fingers, co-ordination, play simple games and so on. The top floor has been laid out as a playground with artificial grass, a swing, a see-saw and space for playing with balls. Sadly, because of the land-grabbing, there is no space around Bethlehem for playgrounds or indeed any form of sport. It is small wonder that as the children grow up they become frustrated and aggression towards the Israelis rears its ugly head. We were meant to visit another Centre on our last morning, but sadly the barriers were down along that particular route so we couldn't get there – enough said. I came home with such mixed feelings: while I can totally understand the need for the Israelis to have their own country after all the persecution they suffered for so long, I cannot understand how they can then do the same to the Palestinians, and I certainly can't see an end to it all. However, while I can do nothing about the politics, I can continue to support ABCD and fully intend to do so.

Can I ask if anyone has any "educational" toys (duplo, shapes to go into boxes, Pelmanism cards, etc) please let me have them and I will make sure they end up at one of these remarkable Centres. Equally, financial donations – of whatever size - to ABCD will be hugely appreciated.

The month of May once again sees a varied schedule of films at Cuddington's community cinema. On Thursday 4th May we'll be screening ***She Said*** (cert. 15), the remarkable true story of how *New York Times* reporters Megan Twohey and Jodi Kantor went from underdogs to inspirations by shattering the silence surrounding sexual assault in Hollywood. Determined to expose the truth many feared to tell, Megan and Jodi's partnership helped ignite a movement that led to the exposition of Harvey Weinstein and his exploitative crimes. "Carey Mulligan stands out in this powerful account of how two journalists brought the disgraced movie mogul to justice," says *The Times*. "Excellent performances bring out the best in this David and Goliath story that reverberated around the world," says *The Evening Standard*.

On 11th May our film will be ***A Man Called Otto*** (cert. 15), based on the comical and moving No. 1 *New York Times* bestseller. Tom Hanks plays Otto, a grumpy, grieving widower who is very set in his ways and considers ending his life. When a lively young family moves in next door, however, he meets his match in quick-witted and very pregnant Marisol, and the acquaintance leads to an unlikely friendship that turns his world upside-down. "A winningly grumpy performance from Tom Hanks – and a winningly sunny one from Mariana Treviño – ensure for a very watchable take on the 'giving life another shot' subgenre," says *Empire*. "A formulaic but charming grumpy old man movie," says *The Guardian*.

Then on 18th May we'll be showing the National Theatre's new play ***Best of Enemies***, James Graham's multiple award-winning new drama starring David Harewood and Zachary Quinto as feuding political rivals. In 1968 America, as two men fight to become the next

president, all eyes are on the battle between two others: the cunningly conservative William F. Buckley Jr. and the unruly liberal Gore Vidal. During a new nightly television format, they debate the moral landscape of a shattered nation. As beliefs are challenged and slurs slung, a new frontier in American politics is opening and television news is about to be transformed forever. "Dynamic and intoxicating ... James Graham's play is as searingly insightful as ever", says *The Evening Standard*. "An enthralling political pub brawl ... the most satisfying play of the year," says *The Sunday Times*.

On the 25th our film will be ***Armageddon Time*** (cert. 15). This film is *not* an apocalyptic disaster movie!

Instead, set in 1980s New York, *Armageddon Time* is a deeply personal story about the strength of family, the complexity of friendship and the generational pursuit of the American Dream. Inspired by director James Gray's

childhood experiences, the story follows Paul, a young Jewish-American boy who befriends an African-American classmate. Paul struggles with the expectations of his family and with growing up in a world of privilege, inequality and prejudice. "Hopkins shines, his emotive portrayal proving another late-career triumph," says *The Radio Times*.



"A terrific coming-of-age drama," says *The Guardian*. Looking ahead to June: on the 1st we'll be screening ***Mr. Michael's List***, a sharp, funny period romance "with more than a dash of Bridgerton" (*The Telegraph*). On the 15th, the National Theatre's 2019 production of Phoebe Waller-Bridge's hilarious one-woman show ***Fleabag*** gets a re-release in cinemas. On the 22nd we'll have ***The Fabelmans***, Steven Spielberg's charming coming-of-age story inspired by his own childhood. Then finally, on the 29th, we'll be showing ***What's Love Got To Do With It?***, a bright and breezy new cross-culture romcom starring Lily James, Shazad Latif and Emma Thompson.
